#### Statutes / Regulations

#### **The Indian Gaming Regulatory Act (IGRA)**

25 U.S.C. §§ 2701 to 2721

This 1988 Federal act establishes the jurisdictional framework that governs Native American gaming. The act also established the National Indian Gaming Commission.

#### **Johnson Act**

15 U.S.C.A. §§ 1171 to 1178

"The Johnson Act, as amended, generally prohibits the manufacture, possession, use, sale, or transportation of any 'gambling device'. ... The Indian Gaming Regulatory Act, 25 U.S.C. § 2701 et seq., includes an exception to the Johnson Act prohibition against gambling devices in Indian Country."
